Future Interests. Example 1: B, who has a fee simple title to property, conveys a life estate in the property to C, with remainder to D, if D survives C. Both the grantor (aka transferor), who is the one that conveys the property interest, and the grantee (aka transferee), who receives the property interest,...

Any of these present estates may be further limited in time by imposing conditions that will terminate the estate. For example, a grant may give property to person A as long as she uses the property for residential purposes. When such conditions limit the duration of an estate, the estate is called defeasible. Definition. In property law, a future interest is the right to possess property in the future.. Overview. A future interest is in direct contrast with a present right to property, also referred to as a possessory estate.. A future interest may be conditioned upon the occurrence of a certain condition or event, or it can also be unconditional.

Property Law Outline - Future Interests in Freehold Estates. Future Interests retained by GRANTORS; Reversion (PI = LE)- residual future interest left in grantor. Ex: G grants LE to A. G retains reversion, because he (or his heirs) will get the land after A dies. A reversion is alienable, devisable, and descendible.

In property law and real estate, a future interest is a legal right to property ownership that does not include the right to present possession or enjoyment of the property. Future interests are created on the formation of a defeasible estate; that is, an estate with a condition or event triggering transfer of possessory ownership. A common example is the landlord-tenant relationship.

Lesser Estates - Size Matters. An estate is simply an interest in land that is defined by two characteristics: (a) the fact that you either have a current right to possess the land or may have a right to possess it in the future (hence, future interests) and (b) the duration the person has possession.

Other Issues Regarding Future Interests. In the previous subchapters, when we discussed remainder interests (ie. the interest of a third party after a life estate or after a non-freehold estate), we assumed that the holder of the remainder interest was specifically named by the grantor. However, this need not be the case.
